FINANCE

As we enter into Winter the issues that we have encountered as a result of the Covid-19 pandemic continue to challenge the Council. Our staff have continued to work throughout the spring and summer to maintain our community buildings, sports pitches and play areas to the high standards that we have set ourselves in the past.

When the restrictions were eased during the summer, we were able to welcome some hirers back. It was wonderful to be able to open our play areas and to see children enjoying themselves again. We were able to accommodate some amateur football within our facilities, always ensuring that Covid-19 guidelines are maintained. We have also made changes to our community buildings to meet the Covid-19 guidelines and have seen some users returning.

However, as we progress through the year we are having to take stringent action to limit our expenditure on works that are not essential.

The budget we set at the beginning of the year was based on normal times with anticipated income and expenditure. We have had to cover our expenditure on staffing etc without support from Government but have seen our income fall dramatically. Eastleigh Borough Council have supported us with a grant which was very welcome and has enabled us to continue providing a high standard of service throughout. There were many projects that we hoped to undertake this year which have had to be shelved to a future date. The Town Clerk and her staff continue to look for ways in which we can make savings on the expenditure without affecting our core activities.

The important point to remember is that whatever we do we need to make sure we continue to maintain the highest standards to defeat the virus.

OLD SCHOOL HOUSE INSCRIPTION

The Old School building at the junction of Bursledon Road and St John's, hold many fond memories for residents, some of whom quite possibly attended school there.

The first thirteen pupils were not admitted to the National School until January 18th, 1864. Within 20 years, the school building had been enlarged twice to keep up with the population increases. It was not until 1902 that more land was allocated to provide a playground big enough to accommodate all the pupils.

Attendance fees were calculated on a means basis until they were abolished in 1891 when the school received funding under the Free Education Act.





The foundation stone (pictured here) bearing the inscription "Feed my Lambs" was laid in 1863. It is believed the inscription has a biblical reference to (John 21:15, ESV).

"21:15 When they had finished breakfast, Jesus said to Simon Peter, 'Simon, son of John, do you love me more than these?' Peter said to him, 'Yes, Lord; you know that I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Feed my lambs'"

Despite our repeated attempts to unearth details of the foundation stone we have been unsuccessful in identifying the rest of the inscription and would be very keen to find someone that has photo's of the original or can recall any details from it.

HOME FARM WOODLAND

We are pleased to confirm that Home Farm Woodland will be transferred to the Town Council in the coming months. The woodland is located along St John's Road towards the motorway and is known locally as Candy's wood, presumed to be named after Wilfred Candy who purchased the land in 1953.

At just over 7 acres, this is a lovely area that has been popular with residents for many years. It is a predominantly native woodland with notable Oak and Beech, interspersed with Birch, Cherry and Hazel.

Works took place over the summer in advance of the transfer to reduce and remove invasive non-native species and this work will continue over the coming years. Once it has been transferred the woodland will be managed by HETC ensuring it remains fully accessible for future generations. This is a wonderful new asset for the residents of Hedge End.

There is an area of land to the rear of the woodland that remains in private ownership and you are requested not to trespass onto this area which is fenced as recent damage has been caused to the fencing to gain access.

HEDGE END VILLAGE MARKET

Since the end of August, Hedge End Village Market, organised by Eastleigh Borough Council in collaboration with Hedge End Town Council has been steadily growing each week, with local independent businesses keen to show off their trade to passing visitors.

From fruit and vegetable stalls to children's books and confectionary, the market has something for everybody. The feedback from stallholders has been really positive. Held weekly on Wednesday on the former Budgens site, the market has been a welcome addition to the community, with residents continuing to show their support.



NOTICEBOARD TRAILS

Some of the eagled eyed amongst you, may have noticed the displays on certain local noticeboards throughout school holidays this year. The Town Council has been working to engage the community with trails locally, which could often be reached on foot, to keep inquisitive minds occupied.

The Hedge End History Trail shared historic facts on each noticeboard based on a letter, which in turn made up the name of a location to collect a small prize. Whilst a relatively new town in comparison to other neighbouring towns in the area, Hedge End still holds some fascinating facts which we were keen to share.

Our second trail led us to Dowd's Farm to explore Autumn as well as spotting some the key residents which call Dowd's Farm home. The emphasis on discovering as many features on the map as possible and enjoying the great outdoors.

HMS Cricket was constructed in 1943 and it provided accommodation and training fo up to 4000 crew of some of the thousands of assault craft that took part in the D-Day andings. The troops lived in 110 Nissan huts, each holding up to 24 men in total. From 23 May 1944, during the final preparations for D-Day, the base was completely sealed. It was reported that before D-Day a bomb had fallen on the camp and was reputed to have killed twenty-two sailors.

Day approached, the area became a hive of activity, with soldiers camped it Johns Recreational ground and convoys of tanks and lorries parked in the er of the tree lined roads awaiting their turn to embark on the armada of inve








The Hedge End Auxiliary unit base was formed in 1940 under the guidance of The reage cit of Number your bases was brinken in 3-by on their the globalbe of Winston Churchill and located in the Methodist Church on St. Johns Road. They were specially trained secret units of between four and eight men who had good knowledge of the local countryside. People like countrymen, woodsmen and poachers were considered to have suitable skills for the role.

They remained under cover as part of the local volunteer group, but were prepared if They remained under cover as part of the local volunteer group, but were prepared the Germans invaded to cause as much mayhem and sabotage as possible. They even had a secret underground base full of explosives, weapons and supplies! They practiced by doing things like breaking into buildings without getting caught. They were believed to be responsible for the explosion which formed the old sandpit in St. John's Wood now known as Candy's Wood.





When the catastrophic explosion happened in Beirut Rotarian David Small and his wife Sally decided to do something to help raise funds to support this worthwhile cause. Starting on October 3rd they drove their 1976 Triumph Stag from Hedge End to John O'Groats and then to Lands End, finally returning to Hedge End on October 6th.

The target time for the 705 miles from Hedge End to John O'Groats was about 13 hours and after a short overnight break there, their 835 mile journey to Lands End was around 15 hours, followed by the 240 mile trip back to Hedge End. Despite some very wet weather, they covered the entire 1783 miles with only essential stops and overnight stays.

CONSERVATION

Wildern Local Nature Reserve

November, a drab day, on a tour of the reserve. I'm at Coltsfoot balancing pond where once there was a fen. The shallow pond does not succumb to drought and whilst it contains introduced invasive, non-native plants, and fish, native and non-native, it hosts significant biodiversity, including 19 of the 21 recorded dragonflies. Something catches my eye amongst the rushes and grasses. Yes!

A damselfly. I bend double to get a closer look and see it's not one of the usual suspects – perhaps a female Emerald? I go on a photographic binge and later at home peer in anticipation at the uploaded images (thank goodness for the digital age), to be thrilled that in fact we have the rare Small Red Damselfly.

A species restricted to heathlands in southern England and west Wales, questions arise – has it been here all along as a relict population? Is it a wanderer? If so, where from? The adjacent Wildern Moor, possibly? A flooded meadow, with heathland species such as Purple Moor-grass and Silver Birch, but no heather. Hmmm...





On the scarce species theme and reflective of the biodiversity and wetland nature of the reserve, the Red-tipped Clearwing moth was recorded in the mire area of Hogsty Corner and by Coltsfoot Pond, the latter being shown here from 6th July...







Not all highlights are rarities – a female Roe Deer has been a regular feature. Here she is in Wildern Moor.

And whilst foxes have been captured on video by a local resident, this is our first photograph of one – again, in Wildern Moor, and thought to be one of this year's offspring establishing territory.

The Council arrange for a couple of Dexter cattle (Pepsi and Fern) to graze Wildern Moor from late Summer, and they have become familiar faces, doing a grand job. Here's Pepsi.

We hope this gives you a flavour of the Reserve - Wildern LNR is 10 hectares of wildlife corridors. It's a precious and increasingly rare series of habitats, that warrant safeguarding and management to protect and enhance what remains. Our Friends group is passionate about this please join us:


HEDGE END HISTORY

ALI VISITS HEDGE END

October marked the start of Black History Month, the annual celebration of the history, achievements and contributions of black people in the UK. Events celebrating African and Caribbean cultures will usually take place across the UK until October 31.

With this in mind, the Town Council thoughts were drawn to the iconic moment in Hedge End History when sporting legend Muhammad Ali took the village by surprise.

Why you might ask was Muhammad Ali visiting Hedge End...? Great question! The answer being as part of a nationwide campaign to promote the malted milk drink Ovaltine. He visited the former Fine Fayre supermarket on his tour (now Cotswold Outdoor retailers) and was met by a crowd of adoring fans who turned out in their masses to greet the boxing legend.



It has been said that he told the crowd how Ovaltine was the first thing he had ever promoted, saying: "I don't promote alcohol, cigarettes or beer - nor do I make any movies. I have turned down offers of 10 million dollars to advertise things I do not believe in."

Known for our love of tea and hot drinks here in the UK, it was thought that Ovaltine was a way in which Ali could reach the hearts of the British public outside of the boxing ring.

Ali sadly died in 2016 at the age of 74 after a long battle against Parkinson's Disease. A plaque was funded that year by Black History Month South and unveiled by then Mayor of Eastleigh, Cllr Des Scott, at the 2000 Centre in Hedge End.

The plaque can still be seen outside Cotswold Outdoor retailers to this day. Have you seen it? Remember to look up!
