A Note From

The Town Clerk's Desk

The sun is streaming through my office window from a cloudless sky and the sky is a forget-menot blue. The weather reminds me that Spring is just around the corner and we can look forward to longer days of light and hopefully, warmer weather! We didn't fare badly over winter and I recollect only one day when we had a brief spell of snow in Hedge End and that only lasted until the afternoon!

We all know the power of an old song to trigger vivid memories that seem to transport us back in time and space. What songs bring back emotional memories from your past? The songs we love become woven into a tapestry entwined with the people, seasons, and locations throughout our life span. What is the science behind the ability of music to evoke such strong memories of the people and places from our past?

One morning not long ago, I was standing in line at a store in Hedge End and the song Every Breath You Take by Police from 1983 came on in the background. I hadn't heard this song for some time. Suddenly, I was overcome by flashbacks of people, places and emotions. The deep connection that music creates to romance, heartbreak and a wide range of other joyful and sometimes painful memories, is a universal phenomenon.

Has a song on the car stereo, or in a store, recently caught you off guard and brought back a tidal wave of memories? Why do autobiographical memories linked to music remain so rich and textured? Interestingly, it appears that if you haven't heard a song in years the song seems to remain purer and the song will evoke stronger specific memories of a time and place from your past. The memories linked to overplayed songs can become diluted because it appears that the snapshots in your mind become updated and replace the associated memory link that existed.

Music, in whatever genre, is a powerful tool capable of making you lose yourself in a sea of memories. What is it about the opening bars of a particular

piece of music that instantly triggers an incredible thought process resulting in a flood of reminiscences that you thought had long been forgotten and locked away in the back of your mind in a box marked 'That was then'? It was a powerful experience as I left the store and the feelings associated with my particular memory stayed with me for some considerable time afterwards.

A few weeks back, I went for a long walk around Hedge End and it must be appreciated what delights are available quite literally on your door-step. There are many hidden joys in Hedge End that you could so easily fail to notice as we go about our daily business. Everywhere, there are signs that spring is certainly on its way. The crocuses are starting to peep through and the bluebells are beginning to awaken and song thrushes are starting to sing. If snowdrops signify the hope of spring, then bluebells certainly signal its arrival. We will soon expect to see woodlands carpeted with them in late April/early May together with carpets of daffodils. I would recommend a walk to all whether it is just a few minutes or a couple of hours around Hedge End, it makes no difference. It is well worth your while and I promise you, you will be pleasantly surprised.

If the weather forecasters are to be believed, Hedge End is soon going to enjoy a period of sustained warmer weather. This will make for a pleasant change and we look forward to good weather for the start of the paddling pool season now incredibly into its 13th year of operation!

ARE YOU REGISTERED TO VOTE?

There is a new system in place now and most people already registered will find that they have been automatically registered under the new system.

However, if not, to be eligible to vote, everyone is responsible for registering themselves and not leaving it to the 'Head of the Household' as under the old system.

A form can be found on-line, which has to be signed and posted back to Eastleigh Borough Council, Eastleigh House, Upper Market Street, Eastleigh, SO50 9YN to arrive before 20 April 2015. Your date of birth and National Insurance number will also be needed. Incidentally, if you have lost your National Insurance number, please go to the website -

www.gov.uk/lost-national-insurance-number or Phone: 0300 200 3502 and they can help.

Anyone on the electoral register can apply for a postal vote and applications must be received at least eleven working days before the election.

BABY PROMS COMES TO HEDGE END

Baby Proms is a local, monthly concert series for babies, toddlers and their grown-ups...

Back in December, I read of how the renowned violinst Kyung-Wha Chung had berated the parents of a coughing child in the audience, telling them from the stage 'maybe bring her back when she's older'. I thought it was such a shame that a musician whose own piano studies began at age four could be so dismissive of children's enjoyment of music - so I decided to create Baby Proms. The idea is that the children can experience classical music without pressure to sit still or keep quiet.

They are welcome to sit, crawl, dance, nap, feed, speak, cry, listen or just let the music wash over them. The adults can enjoy a quality concert in a relaxed and informal setting.



The concerts take place at St. Luke's Church, Hedge End, SO30 2US, on the first Thursday of each month, from 10.45 - 11.30am. COMMUNITY TENNIS AT WOODHOUSE LANE

The Tennis courts at Woodhouse Lane Leisure Park have been refurbished and soon this popular facility will be ready for the game of tennis throughout the year with improved letting and management systems.

Hedge End Town Council, with the guidance of the Hampshire & Isle of Wight Lawn Tennis Association, seeks to provide a Community Tennis Programme. In order to achieve maximum use of the Tennis Courts, the facility required improvements to secure the courts with substantial perimeter weld mesh fence, works to improve the court markings and surfacing as well as the provision of systems to streamline membership and bookings.

The Town Council was able to raise 33% of the required budget with the balance funded by Hampshire Playing Fields Association, Hampshire County Councillor Rupert Kyrle, Lawn Tennis Association Operations Ltd., and Hampshire Isle of Wight LTA.

In securing the courts, the gate has been fitted with a locking system which provides online readers and updaters with a small portable programming device, which will be essential to implement management of letting and to audit the use of an access control system by pre-coded key fob.

New facilities include, the purchase of Family Key Fobs, Annual Membership and Coaching sessions, as well as 'Play on Demand'.

Court markings will not be completed until early spring in the hope of drier weather. With this in mind, the Town Council envisage the re-opening of the courts mid-April – early May, 2015.

HEWEB YOUTH TEAM OUT AND ABOUT

The Youth Team, based at The Box, Wildern Lane are employed by Hedge



End Town Council and will be delivering 'street based' youth work via the Street Talk project minibus every Wednesday evening between 6.30-9.30pm. Working with local young people aged 13-21 across the Hedge End, West End and Botley (HEWEB) area.

Youth Team Leader, Donna Brewer explains

"The street based youth work team 'outreach service' delivers youth work out on the streets, engaging with young people in places they like to meet. We offer advice, information and support to young people on issues that are really important to them.

All staff hold a current DBS certificate (Disclosure & Barring Service, previously known as CRB) and carry Hedge End Town Council identification at all times.

We do go out on a specific route, however young people can also **call us on the project mobile 07534563424** and we will meet them wherever they are within the HEWEB area.

Look out for the blue and yellow Street Talk bus around Woodhouse Lane Skate Park, Greta Park, Botley Recreation Ground, Dowds Farm, Grange Park (Drummond Road Area), Hatch Grange, Moorgreen, Rodaway and Turnpike".

The choir rehearses every other Monday, 7.45 – 9.15pm and we are always looking for new members. We are lucky enough to rehearse for free at the Salvation Army Community Centre and we are

totally funded by donations and fundraising, which enables us to buy our music. It really is a fun place - the essence of the choir is fun and enjoyment and a love of singing, and it's very sociable too. We do 'light music' mainly, songs from the shows, Pop (like Abba), spiritual, all sorts and we don't do auditions - you can simply turn up and take part and make new friends along the way. Community News Hedge End Household Waste Recycling Centre

Are you thinking about that all important spring clean? Do you have bags filled with old, unloved and unwanted items from the loft, garage or understairs cupboard, ready for removal to the dump or charity shop?

In England alone, we generate a staggering 177 million tonnes of waste each year*. As well as the cost implications to both businesses and households for its removal, the damage to the environment caused by harmful 'greenhouse' gases emitted from landfill sites, has long been a matter of concern and debate.

On a sunny, but particularly cold February morning, we pulled on our wellies and winter coats and



ventured down to meet Site Manager, Chris McDonald (Hopkins Recycling Ltd) and his team, 'the unsung heroes' of Hampshire County Council's Hedge End Household Waste Recycling Centre (HWRC), who are working tirelessly in all weathers, to sort and extract recycled waste from the bulky

domestic waste brought in by households in Hedge End. We asked Chris to show us around the site and to tell us a little about the work they do to maximise Hedge End's recycling....

Chris explained, "I've worked here now for 15 years and we may be a relatively small site, but we are extremely busy. It may surprise residents to know that Hedge End HWRC received approximately 150,000 vehicle visits in 2014, that's an average of 400 cars per day!

I must have met quite a lot of the local residents too over the years. Hedge End residents are very good at sorting their rubbish, which is really helpful for the team. But, for those that aren't sure 'what goes where', the team here are always on hand to offer help and assistance. We have a very friendly team committed to customer care and we get a lot of

compliments from residents saying 'thank you' for our help.

We are also committed to optimising the recycling levels at



our facility and we are very proud that our site regularly manages to recycle or recover more than 90% of the waste delivered here - meaning less than 10% goes on to landfill, which is great for Hedge End's carbon footprint!

Our site has been both winner and runner up 'Site of the Year' (Hopkins Ltd in association with Hampshire County Council) across 26 sites in Hampshire. It's judged on our customer service excellence, recycling performance, cleanliness and health & safety, so it's a huge honour to be selected and to win... it means we really must be doing something right!

I think the people of Hedge End are so much more aware of the importance of recycling now than when I first arrived 15 years ago. Back in 2000, only 47% of the waste we took in was recycled, so it's a massive achievement to be performing so well in 2014/15. I have a team of 8 staff who meticulously sort through what comes in, to ensure we have stripped everything down into the correct bins. That is why we ask residents to, wherever possible, please segregate their recycling beforehand, as this really does save us valuable time. Whether its cardboard, wood, metal or plastic, it makes our job much

easier, which in turn means we get more waste recycled!

You will notice we have 24 hour CCTV on site with automatic number plate recognition. This enables me to ensure the safety of our visitors and my staff and also to prevent the deposit of trade waste.

The cameras are useful for counting vehicles, helping to resolve any queries or complaints that may occur and are supported by a permit scheme for any residents using a van or large trailer to deliver rubbish from their own home. We ask all visitors to ensure any small children or pets remain in the car, for their own safety. We would also like to remind residents not to pull up and park opposite the parking bays, unless you are specifically removing rubble, as this can make it very difficult for other car users to park safely.



A key part of our site is our sales area, which many people love to browse when they visit. It's an incredibly important part of our site and the

money generated goes towards our running costs. It also gives a new lease of life to people's unwanted items and keeps it away from landfill - it's a win-win situation! People often pop in looking for specific items too such as furniture, gardening equipment, cassette tapes, even paint and if we haven't got the item, we keep an eye out for them.

If we get really good quality mattresses we even sell these, as they often come in perfect condition, they are just no longer needed. All other mattresses get completely stripped down. We are one of the only sites in Hampshire that strips down mattresses because it's a time consuming job, but one we feel is important if we want to maximise our recycling. Same goes for bed bases and sofas, which are stripped of their wood and metal. Everything the team manages to do on site means less for landfill, which is the ultimate goal!

We would really like to encourage residents to collect up their old household batteries and bring these down to us. Many people may still throw these in their black bins at home, but the harsh chemicals eventually leak out in to the soil which is

harmful for the environment. We have large buckets on site here and we get them taken away to be disposed of correctly.

We get an incredible amount of garden waste delivered, so

there must be a lot of avid gardeners here in Hedge End! All of our garden waste is taken away and turned into compost at a special processing plant. This is then bagged up and delivered back to us as soil conditioner, which you can then purchase on site here - it's apparently great for clay soils!

There are certain items that we are not licensed to accept here, such as tyres, oxygen bottles, clinical waste, asbestos and trade waste. If you are not sure please check the website -

www.hants.gov.uk/wap.htm or, alternatively give us a call here on 01489 780028 or refer to the recycling team at Hampshire County Council on 0300 555 1389.

Our site is open 362 days a year from 9am - 6pm in the summer, 9am - 4pm in the winter and 9am - 5pm during March. Since I have been here, we have only had to close unexpectedly on very rare occasions, the most memorable being when a member of my team discovered a hand grenade in someone's rubbish bag. We didn't know whether it had been deactivated or not, so we had to close the site down, evacuate and call the bomb disposal unit - thankfully that was 12 years ago now and we haven't found anything like this since!

We know that coming to do your recycling isn't the nicest of jobs, but we like to think that we can make it a more positive experience for the community as the need to recycle, reuse and minimise waste is so important to reducing the damage to the environment that can be caused by our waste."

Thank you to Chris and his team for showing us the site and for making us feel so welcome.

TREE WARDEN'S REPORT

Well, we are now into 2015 and at the moment the trees and shrubs show little sign of progressing. It is therefore, a welcome sight to see a few daffodils in bloom and on the bird front, the magpies can be seen breaking off small branches to build their

I have often seen trees that have been planted in gardens that, as the years go by, become a problem because of their size. So, if you do wish to plant any trees in your garden and I hope you will, please choose a tree that is ecologically suited to the site. Sometimes, it is best to choose from locally grown stock as they are in tune with the local climate. Some species such as Hawthorn, Holly and Bird Cherry are good for the bird population. Other small trees such as Wayfaring, Spindle, Redbud, Syrian Juniper, Cocks Comb Beech could also be considered.

Before planting any trees, check that there are not any gas mains going through the area. If there is a pipeline, permission must be obtained from the

> National Grid, stating the type of tree wishing to be planted.

Look out for the crocuses and daffodils coming into bloom shortly (fingers crossed)...

Albert Road Baby Memoria

FOR ALL BABIES BORN ASLEEP

Throughout history there are many amazing facts of interest that raise one's emotions and sometimes past practices come to light, that most people nowadays would find difficult to understand. One such tradition of history was discovered within Hedge End Town Council archives quite recently...

During recent archiving, we discovered documents referring to the interment of 30 stillborn babies within Albert Road Cemetery and whilst records identified registration of their parents and the date of burial, it had remained a mystery as to the location of their interments. However, the documents found within the archives clearly explained why their location had not been identified as they were laid to rest in un-consecrated grounds.

History indicates that prior to the 1980's, it was customary that stillborn babies were interred in unconsecrated land and parents were not told where their child lay or given the option of a funeral. It would also seem that there was a train of thought that, as there was no opportunity for the child to be baptised, it was laid to rest in unconsecrated land and the parents urged to forget.

It has long been the unmentionable, undisclosed and unidentified area of Albert Road Cemetery which the Town Council wished to remedy as sensitively and respectfully as possible. In the first instance both staff and Councillors referred to rumour of a location, which none could verify as the last interment had taken place long before employment or serving Council. However, a former and now retired Funeral Director was able to concur that he too had been of the impression that the burials had taken place within the bank of the boundary at the St. John's Road end of the cemetery.

The register of the Burial of Stillborn children provides the date of burial and the names of parents and it was not until archives dating back to 1957

were uncovered, that we were able to identify addresses and found that the babies came from Millbrook, Butlocks Heath, Netley Abbey, Bursledon, West End, Sholing as well as Hedge End, which may also indicate that the parents were not made aware of the final resting place of their child. In recent years, the Town Council has been approached by a man searching for his sibling's grave and when we found his parents named in the Register for Stillborn Children he was shocked to find that the name of the child had not been entered. However, this was the requirement of the time and then to learn that the baby lay in unconsecrated land was very little comfort as we were unable to identify a specific grave. Indeed, we were only able to suggest the area by hearsay.

It is the Burial Authority's duty to ensure that no interment/grave is disturbed and whilst the remaining areas of Albert Road Cemetery decrease, it might be a suggestion long into the future to inter in the very ground that remains unconsecrated, through the mere fact that it has not been identified as interred.

Sands, stillbirth and neonatal death charity, a bereaved parents' group, has been campaigning for sympathetic burial, cremation and memorials for babies with considerable success in recent years. Community baby memorial areas are appearing in cemeteries, crematoria and hospital grounds and cemeteries are increasingly setting up children's burial and memorialisation sections and the Town Council has resolved that it is time that corrective measures are taken and that this part of Albert Road Cemetery is recognised.

The Town Council, with the assistance of funding from County Councillor Rupert Kyrle's County Grants Scheme, have commissioned a commemorative stone with the words "For All Babies Born Asleep 1932 – 1983" to be placed to identify the area of the cemetery. The memorial, a former exhibition model of dark-grey all polished granite with an Angel carved insert and gold leaf lettering, will be

unveiled during a dedication service conducted by Churches Together on the first day of spring, 10.30am, Saturday 21st March, 2015.


