It is impossible in the Northern Hemisphere not to note the beautiful, refreshing days of Spring. The longer daylight hours, pleasant temperatures, sprouting of plants and flowers, and chirping of active, colourful birds beginning their new families, herald a time of renewal. Indeed, as I write this editorial, the sun is streaming into my office and it makes all the difference to the day.

I have recently caught the 'Who Do You Think You Are?' genealogy bug and decided to start tracing my family tree. Whilst working on this project, I started to think about how incredible it would be if time travel were possible and you could go back and meet your relatives. Experience what life was like back then and to see the landscape as it was.

One of man's fantasies has always been to travel through time. Imagine, that you can travel back in time and you have the ability to walk through Hedge End, where the countryside is unspoiled by the hand of man. The people of Hedge End are key to the continuing success of the theatre. It is a brave venture in these uncertain economic times and it is a wonderful advertisement for Hedge End.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank Hedge End scouts and guides for their recent kind invitation to the Hedge End Gang Show, it was a most enjoyable evening and we were very impressed with the enthusiasm and commitment shown by the young people and their leaders. We would also like to take this opportunity to thank all the leaders and helpers of our many and varied voluntary organisations, for without your commitment and enthusiasm, Hedge End would be a much poorer place.

During this year we have welcomed two new members to the Hedge End Town Council Team at the 2000 Centre, Mr Mick Wheatley and Miss Alison Bowen. Mick Wheatley, Caretaker has been permanently recruited to look after Turnpike Pavilion. Many will also know him for his involvement in and organisation of the Remembrance Day Parade in Hedge End.

Highways & Planning Committee

Planning applications got off to a slow start this January but have picked up since then and at the time of writing, we have had 32 applications in 2011. These have ranged from applications for a house extension, a new conservatory, change of use for a business, illuminated signage and several others.

As we have mentioned in previous articles, each application is carefully reviewed on its own merit by committee members, thereby fulfilling our role as a consultee in the planning process. The applications, together with any relevant comments and recommendation of either objection or no objection, are then passed on to Eastleigh Borough Council. It must be remembered that the final decision to permit or refuse a planning application lies with Eastleigh Borough and **not** with Hedge End Town Council.

The Highways and Planning meetings are open to all members of the public should they wish to come along either to hear a specific planning application or just to see the processes involved during a meeting.

The Highways and Planning committee meets at 7.00 pm on the first Wednesday of the month. The committee also meets from 7.00 to 7.30 on the third Wednesday of the month (**prior** to the Full Council meeting) where any new planning applications, which need to be actioned before the first Wednesday of the next month, are discussed.

Spring has arrived and the grass verges are a picture with all the crocuses and daffodils in full bloom. Let's hope this is the sign for a good summer for us all to enjoy.

ALLOTMENTS — We have had very good feedback from our allotment holders regarding the new fencing which now covers all the allotments on the Kane's Hill site. Hopefully this will stop vandalism and people taking short cuts. The new Spring field site is getting very established and lots of requests (with permissions granted) for netting to cover the growing of fruit bushes is proving to be a hive of industry.

PADDLING POOL – This will be opened on 21st May and we are very pleased to say that the Hedge End Social Club are allowing us to use 10 parking spaces for the use of parents. This should help the parking problems.

THE CEMETERY - As you know last year we won the green flag award. It does not stop there, as each year we are still judged to make sure we can retain it. Therefore, our Groundstaff are continuing to do a great job, keeping it up to the standard that we require. I am sure if you do visit there at all you must feel that it really is a very beautiful and tranquil spot.

DOWD'S FARM – The play area is almost completed at Dowd's Farm and if you have not visited it yet, this is a must.

NORMAN RODAWAY – The Hedge End Rangers are hoping that the facilities at the Rodaway Sports field will get the go ahead to enter 'The League' as and when they are ready. We wish them good luck with their project.

TURNPIKE SPORTSFIELDS – The Groundstaff have been working hard to get the cricket pitches ready for the season for use by the junior and senior teams.

THE BOWLING GREEN – The bowling season opens on April 16th for both club members and public. It is a lovely sport and both young and old can enjoy it.

GRETA PARK – We hope to refurbish the toilet and changing room facilities on Greta Park in May / June time. This is well overdue and we do hope that once the job has been completed that all hirers will keep them clean and tidy when they use the facilities. As you can see our Groundstaff are all kept very busy all the year round, but that is the way we want it, to show everyone that we are very proud of our open spaces.

The new coalition government has provided grants to Hampshire County Council and Eastleigh Borough Council to enable them to freeze Council Tax for the next financial year. Unfortunately the coalition's generosity did not extend to parish and town councils. Without a central government grant, Hedge End Town Council has agreed a small increase in its precept which we hope will not be too much of a burden. We have taken over responsibility for a number of green spaces from Eastleigh in the last twelve months and the excellent Dowd's Farm Park has been transferred from the builders direct to the Town Council. We have had to account for these new responsibilities in our budget.

Committee Round-up

Every month the Finance and Administration Committee scrutinises expenditure and with the Town Clerk, is always on the lookout for opportunities to save money. These can be relatively small. For example, this year we have provided pest control training to our groundstaff so that we can cancel a contract with an external company and carry out the service to our allotment holders in house.

At the other end of the scale we have applied for planning consent for a new storage facility for our groundstaff. If approved, this will be in the corner of the car park in Pavilion Road (with additional car parking spaces being made available). We currently rent storage units. This project will be mainly funded by a loan. Instead of rent, we will pay off the loan and at the end, we will own the building which has been designed to meet our expected needs for many years to come. Cllrs Pretty and Peter Hughes have worked hard with the Clerk to achieve this significant milestone.

We are making it easier in future for you to join us in scrutinising our finances. The committee agreed at our March meeting that in future our annual budget and monthly expenditure reports will be published on the Town Council's recently renovated website.


The South East's latest creative landmark, Central to the theatre's programme are its events its exciting gala opening season.

Out & About

Tree Warden Report

Now that the Snowdrop, Forsythia, Crocus and the Daffodil are in bloom, giving their fine bright colours to the areas, it tends to make one forget the winter passing. During this winter we were treated to displays of the picture postcard scenes of the snow and frost layering the branches and covering the hedgerows. The branches on some of these trees are now showing the forming of leaves and others have leaf buds which, at various times in the coming weeks, will also be turning green with leaves. Once again we had significant rainfall which should stand the trees in good stead for the early growth. As trees are regarded as 'the green lungs of the towns' we hope that they will prosper and help to make a healthy environment for us all.

Over the centuries, trees have been brought to our island from all over the world. Generally there is estimated to be around 76 varieties classed as native, if the Willows and a few that could be classed as shrubs or trees are included. Among these are 16 species of rare and endemic tree (found only in the UK) and 14 different Willows. Unfortunately, over the centuries we have also destroyed huge areas of forests, The Scots Pine being a prime example. We see these trees in all parts of the UK. At one time there were large forest areas in Scotland known as the Caledonian Forest. but today only 1% of the original forest survives in isolated locations, including Abernethy Forest and Glen Affric.

The Scots Pine tree has excellent wildlife value with 172 invertebrate species, including **The Pine Hawk-moth** feeding on it. The cones provide food for red squirrels and Scottish crossbills besides other birds nesting or feeding off the insect life. This is only one species of tree, all trees provide life, shelter and food in some form or other so we can ill afford to lose any.

Groundstaff Report

The warmth of spring brings with it a wealth of outdoor maintenance and repair work for the Groundstaff team. We speak to Senior Groundsman, Cyril Mason who explains how the team will be busy in the community of Hedge End this season -

Dowd's Farm Park

Weekly mowing at Dowd's Farm Park begins in May and we are very pleased in how well the park is maturing. Litter picking across all of our parks is completed daily by the team to ensure they stay looking their best.

Hedge End Bowling Green

The team need to prepare the bowling green ready for the new season (Apr – Sept). This involves spraying, cutting (3 times per week), fertilizing, rolling and spraying the green and its banks. We also have to brush the green daily, this lifts the grass and helps dry it out to keep it in top condition for the resident bowling club.

Turnpike Pavilion

The cricket pavilion is extremely busy throughout the year with cricket being played on the square 6 times a week. Both the artificial wicket and cricket square have to be maintained weekly to ensure they remain clean and free of any debris. The cricket square has to be fertilized in the spring then cut once a week and the wicket has to be prepared twice a week to ensure it's in tip top condition. The cricket square is roped off to protect it and we would kindly ask residents not to walk or play football on this area as it destroys the surface for the cricketers.

Rodaway Pavilion

Due to the very wet winter the football pitches have taken quite a battering and a number of them are severely damaged and water logged. To improve the condition of the pitches we are now spiking, harrowing and re-seeding to repair them. We have also noticed that golf is being played on some of the pitches which destroys the surface as it creates large divots.



Scout Group Put Their Green Fingers to Good Use!

Members of the 31st Itchen North Scout Group put their Green fingers to good use to celebrate the 35th anniversary of the Scout Group in the grounds of King's Copse school. The group started up in 1976 with a Cub pack and then expanded with a Sea Scout troop at Freegrounds Junior school in 1979, followed by Beavers colony back at King's Copse in 1980 and finally Venture Scouts in a temporary building nearby in 1982 . Since then the Group has continued to grow in numbers and Scouting knowledge which includes a water activity base at Mercury Marina in Hamble-le-Rice. We have links in the local community and plan to improve the local environment with the planting of bulbs, shrubs and trees in various areas of Hedge End and Botley over the coming years.

Over the last 5 years the Scout and Explorer sections have improved the local environment with help from Eastleigh Borough Council in the planting of over 15000 daffodil bulbs, 500 crocus bulbs, hedge row plants in and around Hedge End. To celebrate the Groups 35th anniversary we arranged to plant hedge rows, shrubs and trees in the grounds of the new King's Copse school, to return the favour as this was the birth place of the 31st Itchen North Scout Group.

The funds for the purchasing of these plants came from a kind donation from Hedge End Herb and Wildflower Group.

The anniversary planting took place on the morning of Saturday the 5th March and to celebrate this planting, section leaders, current and former executive members were invited to plant 8 special trees in the school grounds that had been set aside for their pupils to use for green ecology and environmental projects. The plants were supplied by Hillier's Garden Centre.

The weather was great for this activity and was made easier by the ground already being cleared and prepared for the various hedge row, shrubs and trees to be planted. The pupils and teachers were very grateful for the special addition to their ecology project.

Interview with Skyline Local Radio 102.5FM

Mike Green, Skyline Radio owner, presenter and self-proclaimed 'Old Rocker', speaks to us on a beautiful, sunny morning in March about his work on local community radio station Skyline FM.

We interrupted Mike's morning broadcast to the parishes of Hedge End, Botley and West End to talk to him about life in radio, in Hedge End and in general...

So, Mike how can people tune in to Skyline Radio?

"It's simple, just turn your radio dial to 102.5FM and our DJ's are on air between 7am and midnight, every day. You can also listen to us all over the world via the internet; just go to our website www.skyline.fm and click on 'listen now'. I start each weekday at 7am with the breakfast show giving traffic updates, local news, music and lively discussion which then continues throughout the day."

Can you tell us a little about the history of Skyline Radio?

"Well I've been a DJ with Skyline Radio since its beginning 5 years ago and I became the very proud owner of the station two years ago. We now have 30 DJs working on the station throughout the week, all volunteering their time. We are a non-profit making station and our income is generated through local business advertising which covers the majority of our costs, the rest we have to put in ourselves."

What's the format for the shows?

"Well, each show is unique and we try to keep the format fun and fluid with the principal being that it is live and spontaneous. I believe in old fashioned radio; 100% live! Therefore we don't have a strict music schedule, each DJ can play more or less what they like or they can simply take a request from a listener. The majority of our music comes from the 60s, 70s & 80s with specialist shows focusing on soul, reggae, rock & roll, easy listening & big band in the evenings and weekends, so there's plenty to choose from."

So how did you get into Radio?

"Not wanting to give away my age too much, it all started back in 1964 when I first heard a Radio Caroline broadcast; I just had to be a Radio DJ!

Have you ever met anyone famous?

"Yes, over the years I have got to know a few household names, Tony Blackburn, Jonny Walker, Noel Edmunds, but my closest friendships have been with Jet Harris (former member of The Shadows, (sadly passed away 18 March) who was a good friend of Skyline and the late Simon Dee (influential DJ and 60's TV chat show host), who sadly passed away in 2009 but who I worked with on quite a few shows during my career."

What do you like about Hedge End?

"Well, I've lived in Hedge End for 50 years so I guess I must like it! I really like the parade of shops we have in the village centre, though I wish there were a few more independents rather than all the banks and building societies that have crept in, but it's a friendly place to live with some lovely countryside nearby."

What's your favourite music?

"My favourite song would have to be Bobby Darin's 'Dream Lover', this was the first record I ever played on the radio and is very evocative or Candi Staton's 'Young Hearts Run Free' but of all the music genres, I am most passionate about country rock, rock and roll and doo wop."

When you're not broadcasting what do you like to do in your spare time?

"I am an 'Old Rocker' at heart! I love the music but also the cars and the motorbikes and over the years I have owned a few classics. Currently I have a Mustang convertible but I can't afford to put the petrol in it at the moment (laughs) and a Harley Davidson which I love cruising around on but my absolute favourite has to be my 1940's American Jeep."
