FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

Summer is nearly here and we are beginning to see the benefit that the new Groundsmans' Store in Woodhouse Lane can bring. The centralisation of all of our plant and equipment enables our groundsmen to operate more effectively, avoiding the need to collect their equipment from small stores scattered around Hedge End. Unfortunately, the car park continues to be our biggest concern. The car park specification proposed by our professional team required a surface that would allow water to drain through to the sub soil, whilst providing a surface suitable for pedestrians. This has clearly not been achieved and we are currently working with consultants to find a satisfactory solution to the problem.

The committee continue to closely monitor the expenditure of the Council as there are many demands made upon our resources. We endeavour to work with other agencies to achieve the maximum benefit from our expenditure. I think that the Youth Partnership is a particularly good example of where this has been achieved. I know that the young people of the HEWEB area have benefited

from the local Councils and agencies working together after the County Council withdrew much of their funding.

In past years we have invested in Solar Photovoltaic power on our Community buildings and these are generating significant income as well as free electricity during the daytime. We are always looking at different ideas to achieve similar results for the benefit of the community.

Finally, as in previous years part of our responsibility is to provide detailed accounts on our financial affairs for submission to the external auditor for approval. These are always prepared by our Town Clerk, working with our independent accountant and external auditor. They are scrutinised by this committee before passing to the external auditor for final approval. Copies are available on our website.

Lastly, just the usual reminder that the Finance and Administration committee meets monthly on the first Tuesday of every month and that our meetings are open to the public and we are always pleased to welcome visitors.

The expedition was completed in September 2012, where a team of five headed out to the New Forest with the aim to study 'Man's influence on the environment'. HEDGE END 'SHOPPA' FREE COMMUNITY BUS

As part of Hedge End Town Council's Portas Pilot bid, we were awarded a £10,000 government grant to enable its 'Town Team' to launch a community bus service and incentive scheme in Hedge End during 2013. The aim of the project is to encourage shoppers back into the village centre to shop, rather than visiting out of town shopping centres, increasing the footfall within our local high street and keeping it alive during these challenging economic times.

A Town Team meeting was initiated and local traders were invited to get involved in running the 'Town Team' Committee. Tim Gallagher (The TV Workshop) was elected as Chair and is regularly supported by Derek Firth(Thoughts), Ian Linington (Hedge End Post Office), Shane Lee (J Henry's Fish & Chips) as well as Budgens, Hedge End Bookshop, Hedge End Fruit and Vegetables and Councillors Jane Welsh, Paul Carnell and Margaret Allingham.

The Town Team are now busy working on sourcing a minibus and route planning, as well as finding volunteer drivers, agreeing sponsorship, advertising and branding the service. Traders have also been invited to offer incentives to shoppers for using the community bus once in operation. A list of all participating retailers is currently being compiled and will be distributed through the Town Council's Gazette, website and social networking sites. If you would like to find out more or, if you think you could offer support by volunteering some time to drive the minibus, then we would really love to hear from you!

Early Days in Hedge End

The article by Frances Welsh in the Spring Gazette stirred memories for me also about Wildern Farm, albeit several years earlier...

I too, used to spend many days there with Nigel Haines. He was a friend for many years when I was about 12, in 1951/52. On the farm they had an old lorry and a motorbike, both of which we were allowed to use and it was here that I learned the basics of driving both! We were only allowed to drive the lorry in a field, but the motorbike we could

ride all around the place, though not on the road! I think we only stopped going to



the farm when Nigel joined the Navy.

Another in Hedge End who was a wonderful friend to us kids was W.H.Abraham (pictured above). He would allow us to play in the barns behind Raeburn Dairy (especially handy when it rained). He also put up a set of goal posts for us to play football in the field just beyond the dairy, which was increased to two goals when it was suggested we arranged a match with boys from Botley. What a lovely man he was! At times we were allowed into the dairy where we could either offload the filled milk bottles in crates, (taken away by Mr Davy because they were too heavy for us) or we could load the empty bottles into the washer prior to getting them refilled. At times we could ride and deliver the milk to customers with Sandy Barfoot and his horse and cart. Can you imagine that today with all the health and safety issues, the chance of injury and all the ramifications of that!

I also remember being taken off on several afternoons to a 'rabbit hunt' with the Barfoot's, Davy's and Abraham's. We were all allotted a position over a rabbit burrow, then a ferret would be put down. If the rabbit came up to your net and

you caught it, the chances are you were given the rabbit to take home!

I am so glad to have grown up in the 50's when life was good by comparison and people were allowed to make their own decisions about what was allowable and safe and when we could go here there and everywhere without parents having to worry about our safety. There were times when my mother would send me off with a pack of sandwiches in the morning and not expect to see me until I was hungry again at tea time! In the meantime, we could have ridden off to Botley to play football or Boorley Green to fish in Chancellors Lane river or to ride to Eastleigh to take down train numbers. At the latter place, in Campbell Road, we would dodge into the engine sheds and chance getting thrown out by the Foreman or Chargehand. Didn't stop us going back again though to get that special number on the engine which, we heard, might be hiding away in the nether regions.

Another favourite was going to Hoe Moor (Old Moor before we knew better). I rode my father's bike there on one occasion and another friend, (whose name I know, but will not repeat here) rode that bike into the water and dropped it! I had to wait for the tide to go out to retrieve it and then get it home, dry it and leave it ready for Dad to use if he wanted it. I did not dare repeat that for a very long time...

Hedge End Census Records

What does the 1881 Census tell us about Hedge End?

The environs of 1881 Hedge End is hard to imagine amongst the urban town of today. Most of today's community reside in properties less than 30 years old. However, the 1881 Census records addresses that still stand today and are some 132 years old, the residents of which must often surmise the families residing before them and even perhaps the view from a certain window that would have given a far different vista than that of today. They would also, perhaps, be quite shocked at the size of family that once occupied their home, sometimes as many as 8 or 10 children with ageing grandparents all living under the same roof.

Just seven roads are familiar to today's map of Hedge End: Wildern Lane, Botley Road, Bursledon Road, Woodhouse Lane, Hobb Lane, Shamblehurst Lane and St. John's Road. Most of the Agricultural Labouring community lived in "A Back Road". Netley Firs appears to be an area of gentry, Anne Sarah Coker (63) a Widow of a Merchant, who was born in Bloomsbury, London and John Fowler (61) and his family, who is described as a House & Land Owner. Each of these households employs Domestic Servants. Separate dwellings record Gamekeeper, Gardeners and Coachman with their families.


Public Houses include **Wheatsheaf**, where the publican George J. Wild is also a Blacksmith, **Cricketers Arms** and **Fountain Inn**, both in St. John's Road.

Statistically the most common surnames are **Chalk** (48), **Wellstead** (28), **Jurd** (28), **Tomlin** (26).

William Terry (74) is the local Grocer/ Draper and employs 5 assistants, his neighbour is John Terry (36) who shares the same trade and is most likely his son.

Apart from the expected Farmers, Agricultural Labourers, Market Gardeners, other occupations include Wood Hoopmaker, Sawyer, Carman, Laundress, Miller, Brickmaker. Hoopmakers were often found where baskets or barrels were needed – the main use for wooden hoops by the middle of the 19th century would have been for baskets and light

tubs; barrels tended to be hooped with iron. In Hedge End, Hoopmakers would have been busy providing strawberry baskets and punnets.



Hedge End Toll House is the home of Toll Collectors Henry (59) and Martha (57) Gurman. The residing Vicar of St. John's Vicarage was the Rev. James Palmer Nash (39) from Bristol St. James, an Ancient Parish of Gloucester, with his wife Emily (38), their four children and his father James E. (73), Clergyman without Cure of Souls (retired), mother (75), private Governess Annie L. Humphreys (27) and 5 Domestic Servants.

Familiar locations of Hedge End 2013 appear in the names of Farms in 1881, such as Netley Hill, Holly Grove, Wildern, Freeground, Lake, Flanders, Grange, Shamblehurst. Other familiar names arise from the names of dwellings such as Heath House and Tan House. Myrtle Cottage still stands today and was the home of William Stubbington (38), Coachman/ Domestic Servant, wife Jane and four daughters plus a relative Katherine Wyatt, a Domestic Cook from Marchwood. Up to 5 dwellings show the address as "Nr. Brickfield" amongst which a resident is Joseph Smart (36), Master Brickmaker employing 4 men and 3 boys, his neighbour John King (47) is a Brickmaker. **Grange House** and its Estate is the property of Thomas H. Foord (57) a bachelor of no occupation, from Rochester residing with his nephew James Hellyar (23).

John Taplin (45) of **Woodhouse Lane** is a Farm Bailiff, an overseer appointed by the landowner of an Estate to direct and superintend the farming operations. The Bailiff would often have been in charge of a subsidiary farm under the direct supervision of the employer and managed the farm in the absence of the farmer. He would also buy and sell equipment and produce in market on behalf of the owner.

Whilst these names are familiar in terms of location for most of today's inhabitants, many are also descendent of this thriving village in 1881.

Who are we?

The Hedge End Breakfast Rotary Club is a group of local people, who meet regularly to make a contribution to our local community, in an enjoyable and organised way. Our Rotary Year runs from July to June and we have had a busy, but very enjoyable 12 months.

What have we been up to?

Sunday 7th April 2013 – we held our bi-annual 'Retired People's Tea Party' at the 2000 Centre in Hedge End which was attended by 90 guests! A fabulous afternoon of food, drink, and musical entertainment, ensured a great afternoon was had by all.

Saturday 27th April 2013 – we held our "Race Night" at the 2000 Centre with the profits going to the Stroke Association, the Shree School in Nepal and Rotary Charities. Wildern School, together with the Interact Club and the Rotary Club, recently raised enough funds to pay for 7 computers, plus


generators to go to the Shree School. This school is very remote and only has 7 classes each with around 90 pupils.
