We were very proud once again to receive the Green Flag this year. Thanks to our ground staff for all their hard work, maintaining it and keeping it up to the required standard.

Tree Warden's Report | Public Toilet Survey

TREE WARDEN'S REPORT

Having just come back from one of my rambles around Hedge End last week, I decided to sit in the back garden with a cup of coffee and a



biscuit. Whilst I was waiting for it to cool, a small flock of Long-tailed tits flew into one of the Sycamore trees at the other side of the back car park. It was obvious to me that they were after the many insects inhabiting the tree and I started to wonder how many they could actually eat during one day...

Recently the tree warden at Butlocks Heath organised a bat walk with Jon Stokes from the Tree Council. Jon gave us a talk on life within the bat colony and supplied us with four monitors that amplified the sounds that different species made. There were about 14 of us altogether and we shared the monitors on our walk round the woods. We found that there were two types of bat in the area that evening.

Two things surprised me, one being that bats live for more than seventy years and each one eats about 2000 or more insects per night. Now add that to the number that birds eat and you have some idea of the numbers that are involved.

One other interesting fact we learnt that day was that the oldest living thing known to man, are trees. With some trees calculated to be over 2000 years old.

How many insects have lived in those trees over



Greta Park Play Area

NEW PLAY AREA AT GRETA PARK

There is no doubt that Greta Park play area is a most significant and firm favourite amongst the children of Hedge End. Greta Park is a main focal point within the village and was first recorded as a public open space in 1935.



The existing play area was installed in 2005 and has reached a time for renewal. It has served its purpose well and has stood the test of time in design and quality for the past 11 years, however, the Town Council has a policy and rolling programme of replacing play areas to keep them imaginative, innovative, up to date with fresh creative play for children from toddler age to 12 years.



The footprint of the new play area will be extended by 13 metres further into the park and is designed for integrated play, for children of all abilities within two zoned areas, one for

toddler to 6 years and the second for children 6 – 12 years of age, to direct their energies in a safe and constructive way through natural play, either individually or as a group. The Town Council is keen to modernise this facility, whilst maintaining some traditional play with features of new innovative ideas.

The apparatus will mainly be constructed of steel, with no enclosed areas or large wooden panels, the latter encouraging graffiti and burning, whilst enclosures, such as a playhouse, provides shelter to undesirables.

New bow-top fencing will accommodate the extended play area footprint and the double gate safety feature and access from Upper Northam Road will be replaced with new.

An order has been placed with Sutcliffe Play for the construction and installation of the new play equipment, to take place in September this year, so that children can use the existing play area during the school summer holidays. It is hoped that completion will be in time for opening for the Autumn Half-Term 2016.

A Pull Up Toddler Unit which incorporates a ring climber, slide, drag ramp, shallow climbing ramp with hand grips, low level transfer platform and binoculars. This unit enables easy supervision of the children by carers and parents.



NEW TRAINING COURSE FOR HERITAGE VOLUNTEERS

Thanks to grant funding from the Heritage Lottery Fund a new programme will be launched in September to fund those volunteers who want to offer their support to the heritage sector.

A range of heritage organisations, professional bodies and local authorities have come together to pool resources and expertise to support the history and heritage of our region.

A course will run from the autumn which will include lectures and presentations from professional historians and experts on countryside, architecture and historic buildings. There will be practical sessions on how best to help visitors, promote events and act as ambassadors for local history and local heritage.

Participants will not only get support for study but go on behind the scenes visits to museums and other historic sites and help with the planning for upcoming festivals; like the Jane Austen festivals planned for Southampton and Netley and find out how to get involved in the new heritage attractions that will be opening in 2017 at Gods House Tower in Southampton and the new exhibition centre at The Royal Victoria Country Park.

For those who want to gain a further qualification there will be options to train as tourist guides with the Hamble Valley Heritage Guides and the Southampton Tourist Guides or to join living history interpretation groups.

Cheryl Butler, Head of Culture at Eastleigh Borough Council, who is co-ordinating the recruitment programme said:

"It is really exciting opportunity for anyone who is interested in history and heritage, and with the plans for festivals and events from next year it will not only mean that volunteers will have the opportunity to get recognised for their contribution – but it will be fun!"

The programme is supported by: Eastleigh Borough Council, Gods House Tower, The Hamble Valley Heritage Guides, The Southampton Tourist Guides Association, The Sarah Siddons Fan Club Theatre, Hampshire County Council, The Institute of Tourist Guides and a range of historic venues who will be hosting training sessions.

Carnival News

Hedge End Carnival Report

What a difference a year makes. This time last year we were reporting that the Dog Show had attracted the fewest entries ever because it had been the hottest day of the year, whilst this year it was cancelled because it had been raining for two days!

In contrast to last year, (when a sparsely supported procession took to the streets in bright sunshine) a much bigger and better procession this time around was greeted by the first of the afternoon's three sharp showers as it left the recreation ground. Most people were already out, so the rain had little effect on the number of spectators who gave a total of £1386.47.

As usual the street collection was less than the cost of staging the procession. To have three bands in the procession cost £800 to have the St John Ambulance on duty cost £464.40, to have a Carnival Queen and court cost £300.00, these are just basic expenses without taking into account big sums such as insurance premiums. Usually we can rely on people paying to come into the Gala Show to plug the financial gap but attendance was less than usual as many people went home to dry off rather than come to the show. A big thank you to everyone who took part in the procession we hope to see you next year when the carnival falls on its earliest

Legally, all the street collection has to be donated to charity and by adding in money made throughout the year and at other carnival events, there was more

possible date 1 July 2017.

than £3,000 available to donate to good causes around Hedge End. This means all the groups that requested a donation from carnival funds will receive something. Cheques will be presented at The Firework Fiesta.

Next up is the Carnival AGM on Thursday 22 September in the Village Hall at 7.30pm...

This is when we find out if there are enough people to do the work needed for Hedge End to have its carnival in 2017. If you feel you could make a contribution to the Carnival Committee as we strive to make Hedge End the best place to live, come to the AGM or contact the committee to find out more. You are needed!

The annual Senior Citizens Lunch is being held on Saturday 8 October. The meal is free and open to all Hedge End residents over state retirement age but is limited to a maximum of 100 people. Places are available on a first come first served basis by adding your name to the list which is available at the front counter of Hedge End Post Office during September.

The Fantastic Firework Fiesta & Fun Fair is set for Saturday 12 November...

For the seventh year, admission charges have been held to £3 for an adult and £1 for a child and a family of 2 adults and 2 children £7. This great value is only possible because of the Fun Fair, so make sure that you bring along a few pounds to spend on the fair. 2016 will be the final year at these prices.

The Firework Fiesta is always subject to weather conditions. We advise that you check the carnival website or Facebook page before you set out if the weather is looking dubious:




meal there was brief formal occasion when Elizabeth Carter was installed as our new President by our immediate past President, Malcolm Freemantle.
