

Perhaps many of us have lost the child inside and that magical innocence and wide-eyed wonder experienced as a child.

Hedge End School of Goju-Ryu Karate

On a cold and rather rainy October evening, we eagerly huddled into the village hall to watch Sensei Alan Woodhouse teaching the children of Hedge End, the Japanese martial art of Goju-Ryu Karate and to hear about the clubs fantastic achievements this year...

The Hedge End School of Goju-Ryu Karate was founded by Sensei Alan Woodhouse, 4th Dan IOGKF (Okinawan Goju-Ryu Karate Do Federation) in 2004 and is now the largest Karate Club in Hedge End with over 140 members training each week. They now have 9 classes running weekly for adults and children of all ages and abilities, so its never too late to start! Karate is hard to learn, however it's great fun and perfect for helping children with their concentration, fitness and discipline, building not only a strong fit body but a disciplined mind.

Alan told us "I get huge motivation from seeing kids do well in competition, especially when they think they have no chance and then do really well. Also, when they start and have no confidence or have behaviour problems and with training, they improve in both. Adults often join claiming to be unfit and think they will not cope but then, in a few weeks, gain confidence and really enjoy the training."



Alan has been practising karate since 1979 and currently holds an impressive 6 black belts to his

name. The club is a member of the English Goju-Ryu Karate Association headed by Sensei Ernie Molyneux, 8th Dan who is also the IOGKF World Vice Chief Instructor, the first non Japanese to hold this position. Alan and Assistant Instructor John Fernandez, 2nd Dan who also holds over 20 years karate training experience, train weekly with Chief Instructor Ernie Molyneux which ensures standards are kept high for the school. New adult black belt Mark Diaper is now also training to become an Assistant Instructor.

All instructors must hold CRB, First Aid and instructor insurance, so both adults and children can



be assured they are in safe hands whilst learning the art!

The club has had some fantastic success this year with a number of students being graded up to black belt - Molly Foulkes , Daniel Raquet, Calum McKenzie-Chambers, Elliot Brown and Mark Diaper. During the Southern and London area Junior Goju-Ryu Karate Championships, 40 medals were won and 20 children qualified for the National Championships, where the team performed really well. Well done to all those that took part!

Alan's hopes for the future of the club "I would really like to see the club carry on growing and becoming recognised as a karate school that produces top grade karate practitioners"

CARNIVAL NEWS

The afternoon was rounded off by entertainment from members of the Performing Arts Company.

Community News Hedge Ender's Remembered

WILLIAM H ABRAHAM (1881 - 1963)

William. H. Abraham was a local farmer, dairyman and faithful servant of Hedge End Parish Council for 50 years. He retired in 1962, only a year before his death at the age of 80. A well respected and Christian man, he dedicated his life to the community of Hedge End. We spoke with his granddaughter, local resident Vera Blunt, about the man affectionately known as 'W.H'.

William H. Abraham was born on 20 June 1882, the eldest son of Luke and Sarah Abraham who had four sons. From strawberry pickers in Braishfield, living in bender tents during the summer, the family moved to Botley where they had purchased land to farm in the 1860s on the area known as Botley Common (now Freeground's School, Hobb Lane). When William's father died in 1909, William took over the role of his father, helping his mother to run the farm.

As market gardeners they farmed fruit and vegetables including strawberries, apples and even French beans but, with the purchase of a herd of cows in the 1920s, they soon began producing and selling milk locally. By the end of the 1920s they had moved heavily into the milk retailing business, having set up Raeburn Dairies in 1927 (the building can still be seen on the corner of Hobb Lane and Sherborne Way).

In 1904, William married local girl Dorcas Hibberd, daughter of the first Parish Clerk of Hedge End, Arthur Hibberd (Clerk 1894-1898). They had nine children together, five boys and four girls (one daughter, Helen 'Nell', sadly died in childbirth). They married at the Bible Christian Chapel which stood on St Johns Rd (since demolished, alongside Chapel Drove).

A deeply religious and devout man, William was a 'teetotaller' and frowned upon the consumption of alcohol. With support from his father and brothers, William became the driving force in breaking away from the Bible Christian Chapel in a temperance movement which saw the establishment of the Mission Hall in 1909 (now known as the United

Reformed Church). Here, he spent many years serving the community as a Deacon and Sunday school teacher.

His involvement with both the Winchester Rural Council (now Eastleigh Borough Council) and Hedge End Parish Council spanned a staggering 50 years, where he served as both a Councillor and Chairman on many occasions. He was also heavily involved with the Carnival and always provided dairy lorries for the carnival procession.



A real character in the village, in his latter years he would often be seen sitting by the gate of his home, in raincoat and trilby, just waiting for someone to walk past as he loved to talk to people. In a letter written by Norman Rodaway, the Clerk of Hedge End Parish Council, to William on 1 December 1962, accepting his resignation, he wrote:

'It is hoped by this Council that this letter will be preserved by you so that your future generations may be aware and proud of the illustrious service rendered to the community by one of their family. It is hoped and trusted by all members of this Council and the village at large that God's richest blessing may be bestowed upon you and that in this, the later portion of your life, you may be granted continued good health and happiness'.

'W.H' sadly died less than a year later in 1963, however his legacy still lives on. Both Abraham Close and Raeburn Drive have since been named in his honour.

Local resident Laura Allen, 23, successfully completed her Interior Design Degree at Southampton Solent University and recently spent a week with Hedge End Town Council to gain valuable work experience to help her with her future career...

As a resident of Hedge End, I have lived here for most of my life, it's my home. With its large open fields, tranquil streets and woods filled with mystery just waiting to be discovered and at the heart of it all is a small village with a wonderful community supporting it!

Firstly, I spent time at Fair Oak and Horton Heath Parish Council and I was able to experience a taste of what council life is like. It made my expectations for Hedge End a lot higher as it is a larger council. I was intrigued to discover how the two would compare in size, function and community involvement and I can happily say that Hedge End has surpassed all of my expectations.

Hedge End was once a quiet little town with fewer than 500 people inhabiting it. It has grown to over 20,000 residents and this experience has shown me just how large it really is and how well it is managed by the Town Council.

With each passing year new people are joining Hedge End's community, particularly with the new housing development at Dowd's Farm. The current Hedge End electorate is approximately 19,000. That's a lot of people for the council to keep safe, secure and running efficiently.

In my short time at Hedge End Town Council, I have had an exciting and very interesting experience to say the least. I spent time with Carolyn on the front desk and gained a first-hand view of the types of queries that occur each day in the office. From overgrown trees, to the next Hedge End football game, they are all managed with great care and consideration. Spending time with Kevin, I was able to get a good idea of what his role is and how well it can be done. I was given the opportunity to work on

Sage, deal with invoices, deposits, bookings, banking and BACS payments. The Deputy Town Clerk, Denise taught me a lot about Hedge End's exciting history and



that there was more to our town than I originally thought. Alison showed me her work with the Gazette, website, social networking sites and the Hedge End Calendar and I was able to give some input to its processes as well. All the areas I was fortunate enough to work in, were all so different and I am proud to say that I, in some small way, was a part of it.
